# TRUE FULL-SUN BROMELIADS.

This article appeared in the September 2002 edition of The BromeliAdvisory, the newsletter of the Bromeliad Society of South Florida:

The weather we've had this year has tried our plants in the extreme. While the winter was mild, drought conditions combined with sunny days stressed them. Then came the monsoon rains and the temperature climbed. These conditions tested the survival abilities of our toughest bromeliads and it's been interesting to assess those that flourished versus those that needed more protection.

In our garden, there is one bromeliad that is a clear winner in the full-sun category: <u>Hohenbergia castellanosii</u>. You cannot give this bromeliad too much sun. It's a big, tough plant with upright form and wide green leaves that turn fiery red from the tips down as it gets more sun.

I went to several of our members for suggestions, and listed below are their recommendations. The experts pointed out that most plants that have gone through this year's weather extremes without sunburn had the advantage of being planted in cooler months, thus giving them time to become acclimatised. You can't take a plant from a shady spot and place it in direct sun in July without getting some burn or bleaching. Sudden changes, length of sunny periods and humidity can also cause problems, even for well-established plants.

Here are some of the experts' suggestions for full-sun bromeliads:

Steve Correale, who grows and sells til-

landsias, suggests the following for the full-sun treatment:

<u>Tillandsia fasciculata, capitata, chiapensis, streptophylla, xerographica, concolor, tri-cholepis, bulbosa, caput-medusae, ionantha</u> (all forms), <u>stricta, vernicosa, disticha, didisticha</u>. And don't forget <u>Tillandsia usneoides</u>! As with other genera, if your tillandsias have been growing in the shade, move them to direct sun in the fall or winter.

To sum up: If you can provide your plants with a little shade, even from a nearby palm or your patio screen, they'll thank you. If they're going to be in full sun from sunrise to sunset, get them established in the winter. Otherwise, be prepared for at least a little bleaching. (Thanks to

the following who provided suggestions: Harvey Bullis, Nat DeLeon, Lynne Fieber, Peter Kouchalakos, Sandy Roth and Virginia Schrenker.)

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# TREASURER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED DECEMBER 31ST. 2013.

It is with pleasure that I present this Treasurer's Report for the 2013 year. Firstly, I should indicate that the changes made to the Constitution during the year have ensured that an audit of the accounts is not required.

As a result of these changes, the 2013 Accounts have been inspected by Mr. Bill Ng of Partlett, Chave and Rowland and his certificate is attached. There has been no fee for this service but a suitable gift in appreciation will be made in the near future.

The current Financial Report has been prepared on a part-accruals basis in that the major creditor at 31st. December 2013, (Bromeletter printing) has been brought to account.. Depreciation has also been charged and shown as an expense. The valuation of the Stock of Pots and Books on hand is based on actual cost as far as is possible.

The Profit and Loss Account for the year results in a **surplus of \$1899** after the inclusion of Term Deposit interest. This compares with **\$2962** in 2012.

**INCOME** has decreased by \$1000 to \$24,578, with the main decreases being in Sales of Pots and Books, Plant Sales, Donations and Bank interest. This latter is caused by general interest reductions during the year. Membership Fees and Raffle Proceeds increased over the period.

**EXPENSES** have remained constant, largely due to a decrease in the cost of Pots for purchase.. This has been offset by increases in Bromeletter costs, Rent and Show Costs. The Society also held a 50th. Anniversary function at additional cost.

The Society at 31st. December, 2013 held \$102,550 in Cash and Bank deposits. This includes various Petty Cashes held by the Treasurer and Librarian. The other assets held by the Society are various items of equipment, the Library and a Conference deposit of \$6,090. The only liability of the Society is the December account of \$890 for Bromeletter printing.

The Net Assets of the Society stand at \$114,471 at 31st. December, 2013.

Finally, I would like to thank the Committee for their support during the year but perhaps more importantly, the un-named and unsung volunteers who, at meetings and especially at Show Times, keep this Society rolling.

Thank you to all of you.

# SHOW AND TELL

First up was <u>Werner Raff</u> with a *Tillandsia recurvata*, fairly common in South America but rarely seen here. He took the opportunity to mention that his *Tillandsia usenoides* has just finished flowering; this is its usual flowering time but, unfortunately it has finished for this season. Next were two *Tillandsia schiediana plants*, one quite large, *Till. Schiediana major and the smaller version, Till schiediana minor*.

<u>Peter Fitzgerald</u> brought in a Neoregelia exotica velvet which has suffered badly during our summer heat. It has wilted so much that it appears to have almost died. There are sunburn marks on some leaves but generally every other one has flopped. Some years ago it produced a lot of pups which seemed to indicate that it was a product of tissue culture. Part of the problem with this plant is that it is in a large pot. In order to survive and thrive, the pups need to be kept in small pots. If you are going to try to make pups out of this plant, take it out of the large pot and put it into a smaller one, 130 mm or smaller, so that it can control its environment, something which it cannot do in a pot with so much volume.

**<u>Kerry McNicoll's</u>** contribution was an *Aechmea* 'J.C. Superstar', a large plant with red leaves and a long inflorescence with many flowers.

Next was <u>Michael Ferenczi</u>, with a large, wide-leafed green plant, Aechmea 'Mariae Reginae', from Costa Rica, one of the few bromeliads which have separate male and female plants; this one is a female. Ron Farrugia mentioned that he has four male plants. It is a difficult plant to grow in Sydney's winter climate; he moved it into his glasshouse for the cold weather and when he brought it out into the open in Spring it became sunburnt.

**Bob Larnach** brought in a very large plant, a Vriesea stepiana, sporting an equally large spike with many bracts and which has been out for six weeks. Unfortunately, it does not produce any flowers. Bob also showed another of his plants, almost as spectacular, a *Vrieslandia* 'Jenlar'.

<u>Terry Davis</u> concluded Show ant Tell with the following *Tillandsias*, most of which were in flower:

Mallemontii;

Bandensis.

Simulata;

Capitata peach;

Capitata Manon;

Allesdiana;

Sanhensis;

Lottiae:

Flabellata. He had two of these plants, green form with many red flower spikes and the red form with red leaves.

Streptophylla; again, two plants, one medium size and one very large, with several pups. They grow in different locations and both are in spike.

# PUYA BERTERONIANA

(Bertero 115) by Butcher Jan 2014

his is one of the big Puyas and is not for the 'normal' backyard but can be found in Botanic Gardens, with the Adelaide Botanic gardens being one example and Mt. Tomah in the Blue Mountains in NSW another. You see, when it flowers it can get to 4.5 metres high so is an impressive sight when in flower. Each flower is a metallic blue-green colour. A plant that looks like this but only 2.5 metres high when it flowers is *Puya alpestris*. Both have an odd habit of having the top part of each flowering branch naked of flowers and looking like nature has provided the birds with somewhere to perch. The botanists call Puyas with this habit as 'subgenus *Puya*' and they are generally on the large size. The other subgenus is *Puyopsis* where the flowering branch has flowers all the way to the top.

This is where the problem starts. In 1896 Mez decided to describe parts of a plant that had been found near Valparaiso in Chile by Carlos Bertero. Let us remember the transport situation at that time and ponder on the thoughts of such a collector. "How am I going to get this thing out of the wild – I'll just collect as much material as I am able!" Mez decided it had a totally fertile inflorescence and described *Puya berteroniana*, which was subsequently placed under subgenus *Pitcairniopsis*, which eventually became *Puyopsis*. As a side issue, current molecular studies are showing that the old notion that *Pitcairnia* and *Puya* are closely related is in error.

Back to the plot. In 1935 in Das Pflanzenreich, Mez still had *Puya berteroniana* under *Pitcairniopsis*. In the same year Lyman Smith entered the arena and he was convinced an error had been made, possibly because all the plants being found in the wild near Valparaiso that could be linked to *P. berteroniana* had an inflorescence that had cocky perches! Surely Mez had made a mistake.

So, up to 2013, we had *P. berteroniana* for the large plant found around Valparaiso and the more southerly smaller plant known as *P. alpestris*.

Was Bertero 115 a one off – a natural hybrid or mutation? Had Lyman Smith and all the subsequent writers made wrong assumptions? Georg Zizka and his coworkers thought so and we see details published in Brittonia 65(4): 387-407. 2013

So, now we have *P. berteroniana* treated as P. x berteroniana and NOT in cultivation and a new *P. alpestris* subsp. zoellneri to take its place.

Just think, the next time you are in a Botanical Garden and you see a plant with Puya berteroniana on the label you can flash a copy of this article to put them on the right path!

Finally a few words on natural hybrids. In Brittonia 65(4): 387-407. 2013. we find: 'However, *Puya berteroniana* Mez is here regarded to be a very rare taxon of hybrid origin. Up to now, *Puya* hybrids have been only reported by Luther (2010) who listed two species of hybrid origin (P. x *loxensis* Manzanares & W. Till, P. x *pichinchae* Mez & Sodiro), but no hybrids between representatives of different subgenera have been recorded up to now. However, a hybrid between the genera *Puya* and *Deuterocohnia*, x *Pucohnia* G.H. Anderson ex D.A. Beadle, was published by Beadle (1991).'

Natural hybrids are generally on the backburner as far as botanists are concerned and many are referred to just by parental formula, and the only place they are listed is <a href="http://botu07.bio.uu.nl/bcg/taxonList.php">http://botu07.bio.uu.nl/bcg/taxonList.php</a>. Just search on 'nat hyb' to get a list. It is also possible, if only one plant is found, that the difference can be explained by mutation but we still treat it as a natural hybrid with putative parents. It should be noted here that the parental species' names are in alphabetical order to easily check on double entries because, in natural hybrids, nobody knows for sure which is the seed parent. There are also many natural hybrids that have been declared but nobody has bothered to publish the name with a multiplication sign.

The citation 'Beadle (1991)' may be referrable by the academic botanist who has easy access to University libraries but mention could have made to the Bromeliad Cultivar Register <a href="http://botu07.bio.uu.nl/bcg/bcr/index.php">http://botu07.bio.uu.nl/bcg/bcr/index.php</a> where easy access to this information is available.
