DECADES. We owned an indoor plant rental business in Mackay and spent lots of our time collecting plants and growing them on suitable for indoor use. During this time we had not discovered Bromeliads - that came about by accident a little later on. We bought a very neglected Bromeliad collection from a friend in Mackay and started out with plants in very poor condition and little or no name tags. Over a period of time we were able to grow these poor plants on to be lovely healthy and colourful specimens and that began our quest to collect more and expand our collection of different Bromeliads. You could say the collection got out of control within a few years and when the workload became too much we sold the collection and the count up was 5,000 potted Bromeliads. We kept around one hundred when we moved to Beachmere and we also held onto our Tillandsia collection as they had become lovely bunched specimens and it was too hard to let them go.

WAITEYS WORDS OF WISDOM

We are pleased to welcome back Len and his words of wisdom. Len's last check up with his specialist confirmed that he is progressing at an impressive rate. It is not just Bromeliads that prosper at Talbot Lodge! There are 2 little hurdles that Len has to jump before he is given the all clear but his heart is not one of them. Editor.

(1) First we have to make up our minds whether we are growing to beautify our gardens, we are collectors or we want to be a commercial grower. Growing for your own garden is by far the easiest path to take. You can pick only the best of the best and let someone else worry about starting from scratch. If you are a collector you may have to gain some extra knowledge to protect your investments. The other option would be commercial. I would prefer not to discuss this option other than say hang on for a bumpy ride.

(2) One of the questions I get asked more times than anything else is 'Where do I put this plant when I get it home?' Without knowing the exact conditions of a stranger's property, advice is generally - if it is a soft plant (Guzmania Vriesea Nidularium etc) as much light as possible without direct sun. As for the rest (Aechmea Neoregelia Canistrum etc) as much sun as possible without burning. Morning sun is much kinder to bromeliads than a west facing aspect.

(3) Another question asked frequently is, 'How often do I water my plants?' This is a tough question to answer with just a general comment on paper, as the answer depends on the type of plant and the mix used by the grower you purchase from. The time of year also has a lot of influence on the answer. My common answer is to treat your bromeliad as you would any other plant in your garden - when you water give a complete drink, saturate the plant and then let it almost dry out before watering again. Commonsense should prevail.

(4) Pests are not a major problem with bromeliads; with a little care they can be easily controlled. I guess fly speck scale and soft scale are the major problems. Everybody tends to use something a little different when it comes to spraying poisons. This is probably best discussed at your study group or meetings. You can help the situation naturally by giving your bromeliads room to get fresh air circulation around them. There are natural remedies available also that are very effective. I am always happy to discuss whatever problems you may have one-on-one if you need a little more clarity on a subject and if I can't help I will find you someone who can.
