







Vriesea 'White Cloud'

Vriesea 'Orange Crush'

Brendan showed a lovely clump of *Vriesea* 'White Cloud' an easy to grow and attractive plant. Marguerite showed a clump of *Vriesea* 'Orange Crush'. well named with six bright orange paddles.

Lynn showed two other smaller growing *Guzmania sanguinea*. The top one is *sanguinea* var. brevipedicellata and the smaller one is from Costa Rica and the leaves are darker, almost brown. The central colours are vibrant but they do not hold colour very long. Take care when removing the expired mother as the flowers self pollinate and there is usually plenty of seed. This seed core will sit at the base of the new plant until ripe, then explode into a mass of soft golden tailed seed. This seed is easy to grow, ('Bromeliad Cultivation Notes' page 6)







Guzmanias are easy to grow once you get the mix right. They will grow in shadier positions than vrieseas. They come in many inflorescence shapes, sizes and colourings. There are many small plants on the market, usually with girls names that have been produced from tissue culture, they reproduce well, so each year you will have one flowering.

Guzmania musaica has both a small and large form. In habitat the small one grows through other vines and therefore does not need a strong root system - in cultivation it seldom makes a good root system so do not blame your growing system!//











9 We planned two sections for neoregelias but with so many beautiful plants we finally had four! Normal, midi, mini & clumps!















10 Flowering Bromeliads











Suddenly I have inflorescences popping out of my bromeliads, such colourful surprises and the beat of Springtime is yet to come! First it was *Aechmea* 'Dart' followed by *brevicollis*, then *weilbachii leodensis* and *pendula* and a billbergia hybrid by Ross Draper. Then I noticed a white fat spearpoint in *Ursulaea macvaughii!* As it cascades out from the centre over the leaves, the scape bracts slowly change to pink

and the ovaries are very scurfy. Then out come the exquisite navy blue flowers! How amazing this plant is.





It has large green leaves with cruel serrations. ending in a vicious point.

Out of flower the boring looking plant takes a square metre of space From offset it takes 5 years to flower, from seed add another3 years. But what a ripper plant it is in spike! Seeds for Christmas presents this year!!

I have a new Facebook friend - Eli Hadish of Israel.

Eli showed some of his plants. I commented they were well grown and he said there were few bromeliads in Israel. I asked Bob to dry out some seeds and we posted 3 sets as a trial. One week later he received them and the following week he messaged to say there were germinations in each set! Well done Eli, we will send more.//
