Show and Tell

Patterned Leaf Vriesea



David shared his experience with his sisters and Vriesea bromeliad. He has two sisters: one resides south of Port Macquarie, NSW, and the other lives in Melbourne. Both are now interested in bromeliads, and despite their differing climates, the plants are thriving.

On the occasion, of his 80th birthday in Sydney, David purchased a Vriesea Pink Goddess for \$150 and shared its striking coloration with us up close. He emphasized the importance of considering the lighting beneath benches when selecting optimal locations for a Vriesea. In 2019, the plant flowered, and he successfully retrieved the pups. It is advisable to use a stable pot, as the large flower may cause the plant to tip over.

Guest Speakers

Tillandsia – presented by Ray Gough



What a man, what a man what a mighty Tillandsia man Ray is.

Ray showed us Tillandsia Ehlersiana XL. (photo) he had brought in for the Popular Vote Competition. He started his collection 37 years ago, where he bought over 300 plants. Feeling very happy with how they were all growing, until THAT day of reckoning occurred. **He found white scale!**

- Small brown, white, or grey bumps stuck to stems and leaves (2-5mm)
- Sticky honeydew coating on leaves below infestation
- Yellow leaves and stunted growth despite good care

What he didn't know at the time was **bromeliads need air to flow through the leaves!**

- **As Ray put it The use of any OIL based spray is a big “no no” !**


Hard lesson, and with the big rains Ray was devastated as he unfortunately lost 250 of his 300 plants. Not to feel defeated and over the years his collection has grown to over 1,000 Tillandsia's today. A feature is that they don't look the same and produce beautiful flowers. He moves them around until they find their position to grow. The pride in Ray's face as she shared that he had Margaret Patterson of Gympie purchase his plants many years ago.

- Ray expressed he would enjoy conducting a demonstration of mounting tillandsias and the items needed at one of the meetings. This would be great especially any tips for presentation when entering the “potted or mounted” section in the popular vote at our meetings

Perhaps the Tillandsia plant, you may be interested in growing so have a chat with Ray at next time at a meeting.

Foliage – Bat Plant presented by Sue McDonald



If the word “bat” was in a conversation what are the descriptive words coming to mind?

Now if the words changed to “bat plant”, those descriptive words, I reckon would be completely different..... and this is exactly what occurred when seeing Sue’s gem of a species. OM Gosh, so elegant, striking features and glorious.

Sue’s face lit up like sunshine as she spoke about her bat plants in their garden. Years ago, Sue bought 3 expensive bat plants online and out of the 3 only 1 survived. However, she didn’t give up and today showed this magnificent plant to the group.

Growing There are 12 species of bat plants, and they are native to Southeastern Asia – Cambodia, Southern China, Malaysia Thailand and used in Chinese medicine. Sue further explained that they are self-pollinating but can grow from seeds 5-9 months before maturing and *use rock minerals rather than fertiliser* as this boosts the flowers when potting up. Very few pests, just the occasional slug. Yuk! They grow from **rhizomes** as understory plants in well drained, moist soil. If you’re intending to grow these in the garden filtered light, make sure the soil holds water well but is extremely well-drained.

- BE CAREFUL if the leaves wilt the bat plant will NOT recover! Always keep one eye on the plant when in the garden.

Flower The Bat plant, also known as the Bat Flower, Cat’s Whiskers and Bat-head Lily, the Bat Plant’s large, lush emerald leaves are surrounded by stunning flowers that mimic a bat in flight. The Bat Plant comes in two equally impressive types; a white variety (*Tacca integrifolia*) and a black variety (*Tacca chantieri*)

- **Black Bat Plant (*Tacca chantieri*):** This distinctive species is recognized for its dark black or deep purple flowers, which are complemented by elongated, whisker-like bracts reaching up to 28 cm. The flowers are set against a backdrop of rich, emerald, green foliage. Commonly cultivated as a focal point in shaded tropical gardens or indoor environments, the Black Bat Plant is valued for its unique and striking appearance.
- **White Bat Plant (*Tacca integrifolia*):** This uncommon species features prominent white upper bracts accompanied by striking black or deep purple flowers beneath. Noted for its ornamental value, the white bat plant can grow up to 1 meter tall. Cultivation can be more demanding, as successful flowering often relies on cross-pollination by flies.
- **Green Bat Flowers:** Certain bat plant species and hybrids produce greenish flowers, which, while relatively rare, contribute distinctiveness to tropical gardens. These blooms retain the signature bat-shaped form and elongated bracts characteristic of the genus.

Perhaps this is a foliage plant you may be interested in growing so have a chat with Sue next time at a meeting.





Get to know your family of Bromeliaceae



Label - Perhaps you have heaps of labels gathered together in a pot called “lost & find”. You may like to find out the “origin” of the bromeliad or the “seed parent” and the “pollan parent”. You can even find out if the bromelaid is a **‘hybrid or cultivar’** or who registered the bromelaid, you may even know this person through introduction or shook their hand at a bromelaid meeting or your neighbour.

As research the original species continues, there maybe name changes to a bromeliad you own. The latest ‘species’ name can be found under **New Bromeliad Taxon List**
