

Sheryl and Len Go to the World Conference!

When the **18th World Bromeliad Conference** was held in Cairns this June 2008 the conference was a significant event both for Australia and personally for two of our members, Sheryl and Len Waite.

Originally the conference had been scheduled for New Orleans but owing to the impa of Hurricane Katrina was moved to Cairns, the *first time ever* that the conference had been held outside the USA.

Over 300 of what the ABC described as the "world's leading and most passionate bro meliad experts and enthusiasts" participated from throughout Australia, Japan, South America, South Africa, Europe, N.Z. and the USA. Len and Sheryl were there too enjoying seminars, observing a Rare Plant auction where broms sold for up to \$100 each and also to talking face-to-face with people who, up until now, they had only known through books and websites (*see below*). "It was like being back at school but in an interesting way", said Len. However, there was more in store for our intrepid Queenslanders...

Len and Sheryl also entered competitions. Unsurprisingly, they so impressed judges that they were awarded:

Three (3) trophy awards: Bob Whitman Award for best specie, *Cryptanthus beuckeri*; Grace Goode Award for the best miniature *Neoregelia* "Small World in Show"; Best Flowering Bromeliad *Deuterocohnia brevifolia*.

Add to the trophies, 11 Merit Awards (which for some odd reason are higher than a First Place award); 4 First awards and 2 Second awards.

We look forward to congratulating these two awesome growers in person and seeing their blue ribbon plants!

Timely Tips for August & September

Len offers this advice for August and September:

- 1. Weed and spray walkways around the nursery using Bindii & Clover Killer, Zero, or Roundup. Prevent weeds from flowering and their seeds germinating in spring time by carefully removing all of them from your pots.
- 2. **Inspect each** *Neoregelia c*arefully by lifting it up and inspecting it from all angles. **Cut off dead leaves** at the base or it will develop scale. If you do see scale, spray with systemic killers such as Confidor or Dimethoate.
- 3. Need to **pot pups**? Start after the Brisbane Exhibition (Ekka) **and fertilize** them with low nitrogen Osmocote. When taking pups off the mother plant spread a little Organic Extra around the base and she may give you more! Guzmanias and Vrieseas need a touch more than other broms.
- 4. Get your **plants into good light** so as to toughen them up for summer. After all, who needs all-green bromeliads?
- 5. From mid-August boost yellow/pale broms with Organic Extra and don't forget to fertilize your lawn with Eco 88 or similar.
- 6. Water broms only when necessary in these winter months and then in the morning only. This applies especially for *Cryptanthus* which hate being wet at night. Rainfall is alright as it means the atmospheric temperature is warm.

Want to "show" your plant?

Len and Sheryl offer these hints: Inspect your bromeliad for scale or other damage and deal with any problems. When happy with the situation, apply some final tender loving care by washing the plant and also the pot. Sheryl uses a baby's bottle brush; the small end is for washing rubbish out of the throat of the plant and the big end is for gently brushing the rest. Presentation counts as much for bromeliads as it does for people!

Finally, never use oil of any kind to make your plant shine as ultimately oil causes permanent damage to your precious plant.
