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



Unfortunately, due to a computer glitch no photos are available of Beryl & Jim Bachelor's garden at Capalaba.



We have so many Billbergias in flower at present the one I have chosen is the "Billbergia eloiseae". The upright leaves of this plant are strong and stand erect, the flower spike emerges as a pointed almost spear like tip and within a few days the pink florescence flower emerges, at first standing erect and then as the floral envelope begins to open it will take on the pendulum like pose. When this pink envelope opens it reveals another spectacular show of colour of green, blue & vellow. The petals as they develop will



begin to role back revealing the internal beauty of the flower. This flower doesn't last as long as some other brom flowers but the show it displays is worth the 10 to 21 days. Planted in a clump form you will have a display for most of winter. Billbergias will take a little more sun than other bromeliad species but still prefer good shaded light as they will burn in direct sun.

When walking around our garden in winter and looking at which of our Bromeliads I could share with you this time I thought we would look at two species, "Aechmea Red Ribbon" which is a cultivar and the "Billbergia". The Red Ribbon although not a spectacular in its floral display, even though this changes from the red berry to deep orange as it matures in the spring and into summer. The foliage of this plant gives a soft blending in the garden with its deep green almost olive



body and striped with burgundy stripes running from the base to the tip. In some plants these stripes can be a broken with the green flecking of the body of the leaf. This brom can be grown as a single plant or in a clump. When in a clump form and in flower this cultivar will provide any shaded spot in garden a soft in fill with other plants. The amount of light will change the colour of the berry like flower pods. This cultivar is a cross of Aechmea racinae x Victoriana v. discolour. The Vriesea (v) cross provides the soft leaf form of the very pleasant plant.
