Secretary's Notes

GLASSHOUSE COUNTRY BROMELIAD SOCIETY Inc.

BY-LAWS - GUIDANCE NOTES

Proposal:

To repeal the existing By-Laws and issue a set of Guidance Notes.

Reason:

In October 2006 a collection of By-Laws was enacted. These By-Laws covered items such as the administration of the society, finance, displays, competition and shows, tips for displaying plants, trips and library. Some of these items are still relevant to the operation and enjoyment of membership but some are not relevant anymore and some even stifle our ways of conducting ourselves. Over the past few years some attempts have been made to amend the by-laws and according to the minutes of previous meetings some of the changes have been voted upon. There is no record of any re-typing of the by-laws to bring them up to date. Some of the current bylaws contradict the Rules [which are based on the government's model rules] and are therefore invalid. The proposition is therefore to repeal all of the current and amended by-laws and in their place, provide a set of guidance notes that can be reviewed and changed at any future time by the management committee or the members at a general meeting.

Guidance Notes:

The draft of the proposed guidance notes follow, and are divided into the headings of administration, meetings, and library. These guidance notes can be added to or amended by the management committee or at the request of members at a general meeting.

Administration:

- The management committee will comprise the President, the Vice President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Newsletter Editor. Each member of the management committee must be members of the society.
- Annual membership fees are set at \$10 per person or \$15 per couple. Fees are due by the date of the annual general meeting. If a member has not paid their membership fees by the end of the year their membership will cease.

General Meetings:

- General meetings [except the annual general meetings] will have a minimal amount of business in its agenda. Business will be handled by the Management Committee and the President will give a brief report on the previous meeting of the management committee.
- Where possible a "popular plant" competition will be held at each general meeting. The competition will have two sections for advanced and novice members with a maximum of two plants per member. First, second and third places will be awarded at each competition with three, two and one point respectively. The member having the highest total of points in each section will be awarded a prize at the end of each year. The member who wins the annual novice competition will automatically be in the advanced section in the following year.
- Member's plant sales may take place and will attract a 10% commission to the society. The bromeliad plants must be clean and free of disease. This requirement will also apply to the "popular plant" competitions.

Library:

• The library is an important and valuable part of the society and members are encouraged to use it by borrowing books, newsletters etc. These books, newsletters etc are available at meetings held in the Mary McKillop Centre and must be returned by the next meeting at the Centre.

Broms By Bob



The bromeliads in the garden at this time of the year have such a wide range of flowering plants. Vriesea are mainly epiphytes and occur in moist, shaded conditions in nature. They usually occur in environments similar to those prevailing in the moist subtropics. Vrieseas have "tanks" formed by their central leaves. These tanks store water that helps the plant to meet their moisture requirements. Many Vrieseas are grown for their inflorescences rather than their foliage. These are categorised as green –leaved Vrieseas (These group is best grown in 115 to 140 mm containers).

Those grown primarily for their attractively marked leaves are often described as foliage Vriesea (These plants are best grown in 140 to 200 mm containers). These *Vrieseas* are mainly epiphytes, so good drainage is essential. These plants require an open mixture, which drains freely and dries out quickly. Avoid any materials that decomposes quickly; this can affect good drainage and thereby damage delicate root growth.

Generally, Vriesea are mediumvary in size from about 150mm diameter. They have smoothusually soft and flexible, foliage that is relatively firm and in shades of green from very light They can be spotted, blotched or

sized plants. However, they can to approximately 1.5 meters in edged, green leaves, which are although a few species have less pliable. The leaves can come to extremely dark, almost black. barred.

One of the most difficult things for growers when you start off, you will collect plant from all sorts of places with or without a name. As you become addicted to collecting bromeliads and you need to know the name of the species and this is when the detective work can really start. This can be a challenge as we have found with the plant displayed. The closest plant we can find to this is Vriesea *firecracker*, (pictured above) but it was too attractive a specimen not to share with you. The spike have been out for about four weeks & the flowers have started to open, the display will be in full bloom in about another two weeks and will be on display until well after Christmas.
