## Derek and Margaret Butcher, OAM

On Australia Day, 26 January 2022, it was announced nationally that both Derek and Margaret Butcher of South Australia had been awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) for 'service to bromeliad horticulture'. Derek and Margaret were foundation members of the Bromeliad Society of South Australia and, over 40 years, rendered magnificent service to the club. Moreover, they contributed to the cultivation, distribution. and knowledge of bromeliads world-wide.

Derek's achievements included the co-organising of and presentation of seminars at bromeliad conferences within Australia and New Zealand but also to the broader international community. He wrote countless guides and articles on bromeliads, had regular columns in national and international journals and compiled and distributed, over many years, a CD enabling identification of all known bromeliad species. He undertook positions within Bromeliad Society International and was made an Honorary Trustee in 2008.

Derek would not have achieved all that he has without the support and cooperation of his wife, Margaret.

She has worked tirelessly with roles in the local society including the taking of minutes at meetings, production of newsletters, organizing conferences, and judging plants at various shows. She also was instrumental in assisting Derek in the production of massive files involving the description of bromeliad species.

'Uncle' Derek and 'Aunty Margaret', as they were known both locally and internationally, have made a significant contribution to bromeliad horticulture world-wide.  $\mathcal{A}dam$

# Julie Reports for February meeting

A speedy AGM saw our excellent committee re-elected by the 37 member's present before commencing the general meeting, raffle, and display plants discussion.





The previously cancelled January meeting again meant two topics for the afternoon – Creative displays and Tillandsias. As it happened, Geoff and Pauline used all tillandsias in their winning entry for the Creative trophy. Geoff's rustic arrangement from a repurposed card rack held, amongst others, *Tillandsia diaguetensis* which had come from Derek Butcher many years ago with the instruction to 'bring it in when it flowers'. Alas, the big moment had passed just before the meeting! We've all been there Geoff.

A close second in the creative display was Cathy's under the sea arrangement which included 2 Neoregelia hybrids labelled 'N. Victoria x Lambert's Pride', and a number of Tillandsias. *T. usneoides* had been effectively used as seagrass draped over two 'seahorses' – natural shapes of found wood.

### Most popular vote for Tillandsia

An easy winner of the most popular vote for Tillandsia was Adam's attractive and well grown *T. chiapensis*. The soft colours of the foliage and flower spike complement one another beautifully but it is a slow grower.

Two *Tillandsia confertiflora* allowed us to compare the different growth rate of plants of the same age but with one mounted and the other potted. In this case the mounted plant had produced better growth and while most of us would also have been happy to have grown the potted one, it was noticeably smaller.



A *Tillandsia* 'Holm's Sunset', yet to form its clumping habit, is the result of a cross between the orange flower form of *T. crocata* and *T. albertiana*. The flowers are somewhat similar in colour to T. 'Rutchman's Orange' which may be more familiar to Adelaide growers; more about this one can be found on bromeliad.org.au.

Tillandsia 'Holm's Sunset'

Tillandsia 'Beauty' in spike originated in Queensland but little is known of its history and 'appears' to be one of the many forms of fasciculata.

Various forms of the *Tillandsia capitata* on display showed good colour, particularly T. 'Kandanga', a Margaret Paterson hybrid from T. *brachycaulis* (a vibrant red) and T. capitata 'Rubra'. Another smaller form of *Tillandsia capitata* was simply labelled 'T. capitata (Orange) RE' which had originally come from seed given to Derek by Renate Ehlers.

Three *Tillandsia* 'Marron' were a colourful addition to the table, two with centres beginning to show differences between green and the usual gold, and the third a long stemmed variety. Another long-stemmed, salmon coloured Tillandsia in this family was - like Geoff's T. diaguetensis - past its impressive flowering. However, the writer of this article is having a last fling (Ed. permitting) and including a photo taken 3 days prior to the meeting.




We belatedly celebrated with the very surprised Sarka her 80<sup>th</sup> birthday which was in December.

### Julie Reports for March meeting

Ideal growing conditions for Bromeliads over Adelaide's relatively mild summer months resulted in not so much of a 'brag' about what had safely made it through the season as a showcase of plants now at their best.

The display tables were full of a good selection of well-grown Bromeliads allowing for both general discussion (led by Adam and Keith) and the requirements for presenting plants in our fast approaching Show and Sales weekend. We were reminded to check the club's show and sales guidelines particularly those aspects that can be overlooked e.g. plants to be free of water, clean and disease free, secure in their pots, and clear seller identification/price tags. Keith, as Registrar of Judges, gave a general overview regarding preparing plants for show and judging. Conformation of the plant is important and to some extent that result lies in the hands of the grower but the point was also made that the natural habit of some Bromeliads does not 'conform' to this ideal. This is where the experience of judges and knowledge of a range of different genera is beneficial.


Sue's eye-catching Neoregelia 'Heat Wave' clump in a hanging basket collected many red 'stars' and was an easy winner of this month's "Summers Brag" trophy

While on Tillandsias, the soft leaved T. multicaulis in spike is, apparently, only one of two Bromeliads that will flower more than once.

A clump of Tillandsia esseriana had two spikes with flowers performing at about their midway stage with one just emerging, another just finishing. This Tillandsia was brought to Australia by Len and Derek in 1996 when they went to the World Conference in Orlando and then on to Germany. Derek's plant clumped readily but didn't flower for him so gave it to me in 2017with the usual instruction. After close inspection once home I phoned Derek to see if he wanted it back again – it was already in spike! It is from an isolated area in Paraguay not known for its Tillandsias but because of its clumping habit is now quite commonly grown in Australia. Adam told us there are three clones of T. esseriana, one being a red-leafed form, but all seem to need to clump before flowering.

A particularly interesting looking Aechmea was A. 'Pagoda', an oddity that came out of tissue culture. It requires a sheltered position but possibly a little more light than it has currently been receiving.

The following has been taken directly from the Bromeliad Cultivar Register AECHMEA 'Pagoda' Skotak C / Boardman  $J^*$  2001



Aechmea 'Pagoda'

Miniature tissue-cultured sport to 10cms. diameter which produces a 2cms. thick stem to 30cms. tall. Distinctive upturned whorls of bronze green leaves may stack vertically or corkscrew around the central stem. Growth is spineless and non-blooming, with basal and leaf axil pups produced. Reg. Doc. 6/2012 by Eloise Beach.

Country of origin: Costa Rica

Seed Parent: fasciata "Saquarema" x (flavorosea x fasciata "spineless")

Pollen Parent: fasciata "Teresopolis" x (fasciata "red foliage" x fasciata "spineless")

Neoregelia 'Blast Off' was another interesting plant on display. My meeting jottings say only 'good/different' – not particularly helpful - so relying once again on the BCR, we learn that its parents are unknown, as is the hybridist although it was registered by Eloise Beach in 2005.

It is known to be highly variable in growth, flowering, and foliage patterns, as can be seen from the photos on this website. It is worth a look because, the 'blooming central flush may be white or raspberry or combinations or it may not bloom at all, but make a central crested raspberry pink rosette crown which can be propagated. Leaves can be white tipped, crossbanded green/white/pink or marbled.' One photo on the website shows a rosette crown as well as well as a normal basal pup.

Keith was rightly proud of this beauty and also of his own hybrid, Vriesea 'Kelly Anne' named after one of his daughters. Clearly this plant has lost none of its vigour over time as could be seen by the healthy leaves and impressively large red spikes.

A tray of 12 gradually maturing Dyckia seedlings made a return visit to the club showing the different influences of both parents – D. marnier lapostolii and D 'Arizona'. They have inherited the good conformation of both so it is hoped that will continue although the colours may change

again over time – as they have in

Orthophytum

Aechmea capixabae (pronounced cap-e-shabe if you are clever) is a medium sized green leafed plant from Brazil producing a bunch of bright yellow/gold berries.

Orthophytum gurkenii provides interest when it develops a tall vibrant green inflorescence which may, on late maturity, produce pups. The deep brown leaves have silver-white broken banding and offsets will also grow at the base of the plant like most Bromeliads. The photo shows both of these types of offsets occurring on an old 'mother' which had previously produced three basal offsets.





Finally, to some discussion on plant names: the use of NOID on a label should be used if the grower has no identification for this plant. It's not helpful to make a wild guess, or simply invent a name.

Another word a buyer may come across is 'Novar' which means the pup/plant has lost the variegation of the mother. It was suggested that if this occurs give the pup a chance to mature before discarding it – or keep it to see if its pup will revert back to the variegated form.

On the display table with a different version again was a Neoregelia with plain outside leaves, but showing correct variegation on the more recent inner growth.

### Introduction: Plant of the month other genera certificate
